# What we've been up to ...

It's been a busy six months since the release of our last termly What's On guide, with a summer term packed full of concerts, tours and festivals.

The end of Epiphany term 2024 saw the 49th annual Durham Drama Festival, organised by Durham Student Theatre. Of these six productions, four have transferred on tour to Edinburgh and beyond this summer, and two competed at the National Student Drama Festival, with student director Emily Browning winning the Buzz Goodbody Award Director Award for her outstanding potential.

In music, Northern Lights A Cappella defended their national championship at the ICCAA tournament, and represented the United Kingdom at the world championships for A Cappella, where alto Lucie Fletcher won the Outstanding Soloist award for her performance of 'Euphoria'. In June, Durham University Orchestral Society Symphony Orchestra and Durham University Choral Society performed *Beethoven's Ninth Symphony* to a sold-out Durham Cathedral, earning a ten-minute standing ovation. The orchestra of around 80 of the University's best musicians and a choir of 100 student voices joined forces with four international soloists, including Durham-born operatic bass Graeme Danby, and renowned emerging Mexican tenor Leonardo Sanchez.

Our other orchestral groups also performed across the city's major venues, including the Palatinate Orchestra's performance of Muggorsky's *Pictures at an Exhibition* and the Orchestral Society's rendition of *Beethoven's Fifth Symphony* at the Town Hall.

June also saw a packed Term for theatre, with fifteen shows opening over three weeks, including several sell-out musicals: Legally Blonde and Shrek the Musical were two firm favourites. Many of our groups also enjoyed a thriving touring summer season. Castle Theatre Company headed on a month-long tour of their production of *As You Like It*, spending a month on the road around the south of England. Six of our groups also performed at the Durham Fringe Festival, in which our very own Sir Thomas Allen Assembly Rooms Theatre acted as the flagship venue. This year, ten of our groups also visited the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, where both The Durham Revue and Footnotes A Cappella received Derek Awards for outstanding performances in their fields.

After a busy summer, we look forward to a packed October to December period, full of all diverse and engaging performances.

Folklore, freedom and fanaticism in Europe

The concert will take yo**u** national identi<mark>t</mark>y.

Durham University Orchestral Society's Michaelmas concert explores contrasting themes of freedom and imperialism in their exploration of European nationalism. Sibelius' *Finlandi*a and Smetana's *Vltava* are tone poems which evoke vast and majestic landscapes as symbols of national pride. We will also play Holmes' *Irlande*, another symphonic poem which calls for political freedom.

Our concert will conclude with *Borodin's Second Symphony*, generally regarded as his best work and a foundation stone of the Russian symphonic sound as it weaves elements of Russian folklore with Western Romanticism.

# Sir Thomas Allen Assembly Rooms Theatre

The Sir Thomas Allen Assembly Rooms Theatre is the home of Durham University Student Performing Arts, as well as being the 160-seat proscenium arch auditorium of many of our theatre productions. You can find us at 40 North Bailey in Durham City.

There are two wheelchair spaces available with free carer seats bookable online or in person for all performances available. The bar is also wheelchairaccessible.

The nearest public parking is at the Prince Bishops Place Car Park, situated at High Street, Durham DH1 3UJ. This car park is a short walk (5 to 10 mins) from the theatre. There is also on-street parking in various locations around the town centre.
