Over the academic year 2024/25, we have celebrated 125 years of Mary's.

Founded in 1899, 33 Claypath in Durham, known as the women's hostel, became home to the first six female students of what is now St Mary's College. Over the past 125 years, thousands of students have entered St Mary's College and called it home.

During a quiet period in the summer of 2024, a colleague and I decided to venture into the basement of St Mary's Fergusson Building, on the site which has been the College's home since 1952. The plan was to clear out "the strong room", which was filled to the brim with memorabilia from years gone by.

Before the digital age, students had to supply passport images of themselves to be used for their student records, interviews during the application process and campus cards. While in the strong room, I came across folders and albums containing passport photos of former St Mary's students. Some images I found go back to the 1960's. There was no rhyme or reason to how they were stored; they weren't in date or alphabetical order. I suspect that many passport photos were stored away when disposing of student records. And as Mary's was an all-female college until 2005, I came across very few passport photos of men.

This gave me an idea. As most of the photos had names on the back, can I reunite former St Mary's ladies with their younger selves, and would they be happy to share their memories of Mary's with me? Thus, the 125 Faces of Mary's collage was created to celebrate this historic anniversary.

I hope you enjoy reading stories from our alumni who feature in the collage. Do you see anyone you recognise?

I'd describe Mary's as fun, free and friendly. Every term had its character and features.

I have many fond memories of my time at Mary's. I was JCR Treasurer of the Social Committee, organising and setting up the balls. I enjoyed playing pool in the basement, piano duets in the practice room, college balls and I sang in the Christmas carol service.

Midsummer ball was my favourite event. We had brilliant comedians of the day as well as music. Rory Bremner and Ronnie Scott stand out.

The porters were fab. I remember one rescuing a necklace for me which had I had dropped down the sink. We had "moral tutors" in those days. I remember being invited to dinner at Mrs Rogister's house, who was mine.

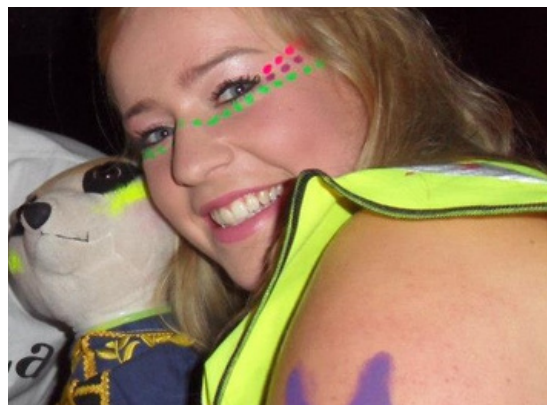

I have many fond memories of Mary's, but the one that has left the greatest impression on me is of walking down the steps from the main building after Thursday Formal to the sound of the Cathedral bells. During the summer the view was wonderful: on dark nights the illuminated cathedral was magical. I often think of all those who have walked down those steps to that view since I left Mary's over 40 years ago.

I have memories of the people at Mary's, too. In my first year I was hospitalised with an inner ear infection and Miss Kenworthy accompanied my father to visit me in the hospital. He never forgot her kindness. There was the College porter, Laurie, who assisted me and my friend Tracey when we were running the college bar. A real Geordie who called us both "Pet", he spent his Wednesday afternoons helping us change the barrels and clean the pipes. In my second year at Mary's, 1981, I became JCR Vice President, and if the JCR President wasn't in Formal, it fell to me to say Grace at the start and end of the meal. During the Easter Term of 1981, Adam and the Ants topped the charts with "Stand and Deliver". Before the internet or catch-up, the only way to see them perform was on Thursday's "Top of the Pops", on the TV in the common room – and Mary's girls wanted to make a quick exit to see Adam Ant. I remember sitting at the far end of the dining hall, near the SCR table, seeing girls leaning forward and fixing me in their gaze, willing me to say the Blessing without which no one could leave the hall. I waited until our tables had been served the main course, then stood to say Grace. I'll never forget the scraping of chairs, the look of surprise on Miss Kenworthy's face, then the rush and flurry of gowns as girls dashed down the side of the dining room!

Since leaving Mary's, I have been back a few times. My husband went to Grey College, although we met after university. The first thing we asked each other when realising we'd both studied at Durham was, "Which college?"

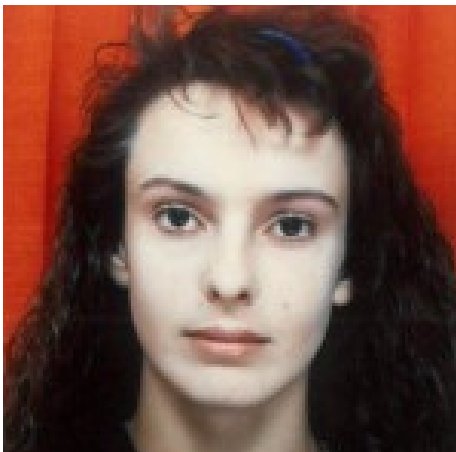


Julie with her father, the steps leading to the Fergusson and Julie with her friend Tracey, left

Zarqaa Chohan

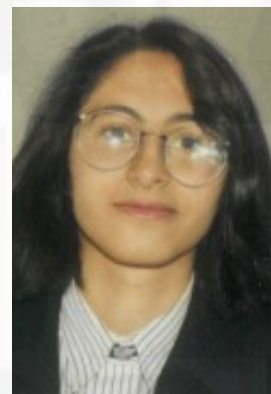
Law

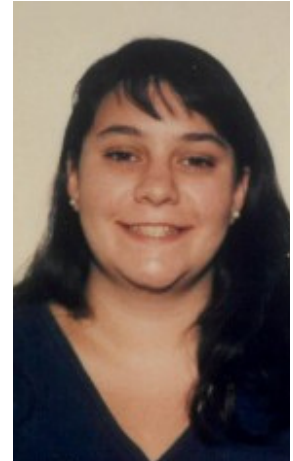
History

We would often congregate in her room, where there would always be a warm welcome. Sarah was also a homebody who loved her parents and her home village of Long Itchington, Warwickshire, where she grew up, and where she invited some of us to visit during the vacations.

Sarah was someone who had big feelings and could get upset easily. So, aid work was an interesting choice of career. Yet she never became "hardened" to life and always remained sensitive to others and the world's many injustices. After her death, colleagues said it was part of what made her so good at what she did.

It was during her time at Durham when she started to grow and spread her wings and, afterwards, she never stopped!
