Trevelyan College's Explore Programme provides enrichment and wellbeing activities for current undergraduate and postgraduate students at Trevs. Launched in 2023, the Explore Programme creates opportunities for our students to develop new skills, gain new experiences, explore new interests, and reflect on graduate attributes. All Explore Programme activities are free and open to all Trevelyan College students. Our activities are designed to encourage our students to *explore without limits* in an environment of support, inclusion and curiosity.

This academic year, we have continued to develop our range of activities for students, and it has been rewarding to see the continued high levels of engagement from our student communities. It was great to work with student leaders and groups in the co-creation of some of our activities this year and we look forward to continuing to develop further ideas next academic year. We have also enjoyed the opportunity to collaborate with partners elsewhere in the University for some of our activities this year.

For Black History Month in October, we were delighted to welcome Dr Beverly Prevatt Goldstein (African Lives in Northern England Project) to deliver our Explore Lecture on 'Discovering African lives in Northern England'. This interesting and insightful lecture provided an opportunity to learn about lesser-known stories and histories from the North East.

In October, we were also pleased to welcome Trevelyan College alumna, Siara Hewitt, back to Trevs to discuss her career journey with current students as part of our Tell Your Story series. The session was organised in collaboration with Ustinov College and enabled students to explore non-linear career paths, hear about Siara's experiences, and to ask questions about her career to date. Following the engaging talk, we continued the conversation over light refreshments, where there was an opportunity to further explore the key themes.

Later in Michaelmas Term, we hosted leadership workshops on 'Introduction to leadership' and 'Building your personal brand' in collaboration with Durham University Leadership Academy and Stephenson College. These workshops enabled students to explore leadership and communication styles, task prioritisation, goal setting and personal branding. In addition, students participated in a CV workshop at the end of term held jointly with Stephenson College.

In November, our Hill Colleges' Chaplain, Revd Fiona Hill led our Act of Remembrance under the large tree on the back lawn. The Act of Remembrance involved students and staff from Trevelyan and Grey Colleges, including music from Grey College Choir and the placement of poppies crocheted by members of Trevelyan College around the tree.

During Michaelmas Term, we hosted numerous wellbeing activities for students including a glow dance class, box hiit session, festive dance fit, and a dog wellbeing session. We also organised PGR Lunches throughout the year, where our postgraduate researchers could dine on High Table with members of the SCR and College Officers to meet and hear about one another's research.

Our students have been active in volunteering activities this year, with the launch of regular litter picks in the local community. Students also took part in several festive volunteering activities before the Christmas vacation, including our Christmas Wish Tree, which supports donations to a local food bank. In Epiphany Term, our Assistant Principal, Dr Hannah Martin, organised information sessions for a volunteering opportunity at Durham Mining Museum.

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In January, we hosted a further skills workshop on 'Conflict Resolution', which enabled students to develop their understanding of strategies for managing difficult conversations. Later in the term, an interview preparation workshop provided insights into interview techniques and approaches to developing confidence in interviews.

Our second Tell Your Story event also took place in January, during which we greatly enjoyed the opportunity to hear from Trevelyan College alumna, Caroline Silver, about her career journey. Participants heard about Caroline's diverse career and contributions to the charity sector, alongside reflections from her time at Trevs. The Tell Your Story series provides valuable opportunities for students to hear directly from alumni about their experiences in various sectors and we look forward to future opportunities to engage alumni in this initiative.

In February, we hosted the first of two graduation events for The Brilliant Club, during which current students shared their experiences of University life with local school children followed by a tour of college. We also hosted further litter picks in Epiphany Term as part of our volunteering activities, followed by brunch in the Dining Hall.

For LGBTQ+ History Month, we welcomed Dr Amy Tooth Murphy (Royal Holloway, University of London) for our Explore Lecture on 'What we talk about when we talk about butch: solidarity and embodiment in butch and transmasc oral histories', followed by dinner with students to continue the discussion.

On International Mother Language Day, we created a video featuring students and staff at Trevelyan College who each said 'Welcome to Trevs' in their first language. In total, 22 languages featured in this year's video, which demonstrates the wide range of languages spoken within our College community.



In Easter Term, our activities included numerous proactive wellbeing activities, including exercise classes, a visit from an ice cream van, and the popular weekly Cake in the Quad events during the examination period. Our Julian Trevelyan Art Prize was also organised for Easter Term, which accepted submissions on any theme and in any medium. Students were able to vote for the highly commended prize, with first place selected by a panel. We provide free art materials for students in the Undercroft and look forward to opportunities to develop our visual art activities in collaboration with the Art Society next academic year. In addition to the Julian Trevelyan Art Prize, we also organised two photography and one poetry competition this academic year and more information about these competitions is available in this edition of Hippocampus.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has engaged in an Explore Programme activity either as a participant, organiser, supporter, or speaker. We look forward to exploring new opportunities for further events and activities next year. The Explore Fund

The Explore Fund provides support to current undergraduate and postgraduate students at Trevelyan College to participate in personal development and student enrichment activities beyond their academic studies.

Within this article, some of the Explore Fund recipients share how these awards have helped them to explore various activities this academic year:

Taekwon Do

The British Universities and Colleges Sport (BUCS) competitions provide a platform for student athletes to showcase their Taekwon Do abilities. These competitions take place three times a year, and each event focuses on two primary disciplines: patterns (also known as "forms") and sparring. In each competition, I enter both disciplines. This approach allows me to experience the full spectrum of Taekwondo as a competitive sport, combining the precision and strategy of patterns with the intensity and physicality of sparring.

Participating in BUCS competitions comes at a significant cost. Entry fees alone amount to approximately £100 per competition, and this is before considering the additional expenses associated with travel and accommodation. Most of these events are held in locations such as London or the Midlands, meaning that, in addition to the entry fees, I need to account for the costs of traveling long distances and finding accommodation. As a result, the financial demands of competing in these events can guickly add up, making Taekwon Do a relatively expensive sport for those who wish to take part in the competitive side.

allowed me to compete without being overly concerned about the financial implications is the support of the Explore Fund bursary. This funding has been instrumental in alleviating the financial strain that often accompanies participation in competitions. The bursary has given me the freedom to focus entirely on my training and performance, without having to worry about the cost of each event. With this support, I am able to concentrate on refining my skills and preparing for competitions, knowing that I have the financial backing to make it happen.

To date, I have participated in two BUCS competitions during this academic year, which were held in Twickenham and Nottingham. Both events were challenging but rewarding experiences, and I am pleased to report that I earned silver medals in both the patterns and sparring disciplines at both competitions.

In addition to competing as an athlete, I have also taken on the role of vice president and competition captain for the university's Taekwon Do club. In this capacity, I am responsible for organizing and leading the team, ensuring that our athletes are well-prepared and supported throughout the competition season. The Explore Fund has played a

crucial role in enabling me to fulfil these responsibilities.

As I reflect on my journey in Taekwon Do, I am filled with gratitude for the opportunities I have been given. From the financial support of the Explore Fund to the encouragement of my teammates and coaches, I have been fortunate to receive the resources and guidance needed to thrive in this sport. Taekwon Do has taught me countless lessons and has been a transformative experience that has shaped not only my physical abilities but also my character.

I was very grateful to receive money from the Explore Fund that covered subs costs for the wide range of music societies I am a part of, allowing me to play music at the highest level in Durham

One particular highlight of a concert, was Durham University Orchestral Society's Symphony Orchestra's Michaelmas concert in Elvet Methodist Church, in which I played Bass Trombone in the following programme of nationalistic music with the concert title "Voices of Nations":

• Finlandia by Jean Sibelius Vlatava from Má vlast by **Bedrich Smetena**

• Irlande by Augusta Holmes • Symphony No. 2 in B minor by Alexnder Borodin

It was a really great experience to be playing in such a high-calibre ensemble, playing such a diverse range of music. I particularly enjoyed Irlande, a piece I was not familiar with, by a composer I had never heard of before. It is a fantastically jolly and exciting piece that explores the themes of Ireland from a French composer with Irish heritage.

Another amazing musical activity the Explore Fund supported was the chance to play in Durham University Light Operatic Group's annual production in Gala Theatre, this year of Gershwin's musical Crazy for You. I played the Bass Trombone in the pit band, which was an incredible experience. Pit band plaving is a completely different experience from my normal playing opportunities, as when in the pit, you are very much not the focus of the performance like you are in an orchestra. In the pit, you are there to support the incredible singing, dancing and acting that is happening on the stage above you, but that doesn't detract from the sense of reward that I felt after the full run of 7 shows in 5 days.

Student Publication Association National Conference

Durham University does not offer a journalism course, and therefore opportunities for student journalists are self-cultivated. Primarily, Durham's independent student newspaper. Palatinate, is an energetic core for students venturing into journalism.

We print fortnightly during term time and, unlike some other student publications who have a sabbatical officer, we are entirely student-led.

This year, I had the privilege of being Editor-in-Chief of *Palatinate*, editing seven editions over the course of two terms. It is, by far, the best thing that I've done in my time at University, and one of the highlights was our trip to Bristol to attend the Student Publication Association National Conference 2024.

The Student Publication Association represents the majority of student publications, from newspapers and journals to zines and pamphlets over a wide range of topics. This year, their biggest conference yet was packed with over fifty speakers and a choice of three different talks every hour for an entire weekend. It was topped off with the National Awards Ceremony, where we had been shortlisted thirteen times and were hoping for a win.

The conference was brimming with energy and journalistic passion and after each talk we returned as a group to share everything we'd learned. Whether it was learning how to write about the pandemic or how to push back on public institutions resisting the Freedom of Information Act, each talk provided a unique, professional, and expert insight into an industry I'd only seen the student side of until now.

For me, the conference really revealed where I want my career to head towards - investigative journalism. I was so inspired that I left the talks bubbling with ideas for the stories I wanted to pursue



next. This manifested itself in the stories I produced this term, looking in detail at the divide between types of education in different colleges in Durham, and examining the impact that empty accommodation has had on the city.

We also had the opportunity to talk to the hundreds of other student journalists at the event. One highlight was the swap shop, where we got to take home copies of all the other student publications at the conference. Getting to hear all the positive feedback for *Palatinate* really made me realise that the impact we have extends beyond Durham but into the wider student journalism realm.

The biggest celebration of the weekend was, of course, the awards ceremony on the Saturday night. I was endlessly proud of the five awards we did achieve - including three wins. It was a huge honour that our podcasts, which were launched under my leadership, won 'Best Project/Initiative', and that our sport section won 'Best Sport Section' for the third year running, a record for the SPAs.

Palatinate is full of the most talented. dedicated, and self-motivated students in Durham, and I'm so glad to have been a part of it. This trip to Bristol, which I was able to attend because of the Trevelyan College Explore Fund, really epitomised why I got involved in the paper, and why I love it so much. The community is so supportive and uplifting and pushes you to produce only your very best work, and I have cherished all I learned from the conference going forward in my career.





Exploring Creativity

This year, students participated in termly creative competitions, which aim to further develop reflective and creative practices within the student community. In Michaelmas Term, the first photography competition focussed on *Explore Journeys* and mainly featured travel, landscape, and location photography. Our second photography competition took place in Epiphany Term on the theme of *Explore Reflections* and included images of reflections in water and on buildings, alongside broader interpretations of the theme. Both competitions included a panel award and a student vote and the winning entries are included alongside this article.

In Epiphany Term, our focus later turned to poetry on the theme of *Explore Perspectives*. The judges were hugely impressed by the creative talent of our students who demonstrated both their technical and storytelling expertise within their submissions. The judges selected two poems for the first and highly commended prizes and you can read these winning entries within this edition of Hippocampus.

Finally, in Easter Term, we hosted our annual Julian Trevelyan Art Prize, which accepted entries on any theme and in any medium. We were pleased to see the range of entries to this visual art competition and hope to develop further visual art opportunities in the future. Thank you to everyone who participated in these activities whether as a student contributor or as a judge. We look forward to seeing the entries in next year's creative competitions.

Global Dynamics Democracy and the tale of five elections

Over the last two years around half the world's population has had the opportunity to participate in a series of national, local, provincial, presidential and parliamentary elections.

While some. Russia for example, have been little more than show elections, and while in some other countries elections have not changed the political landscape of the country concerned, Türkiye and Iran for example, in many others national elections have proved to be decisive, indeed consequential. But the coverage of these important elections has been patchy and insufficient to provide interested parties with an in-depth understanding of the electoral process, an explanation of the outcome of these elections, and their meaning in domestic and foreign policy terms. Trevelyan College's new season of the Global Dynamics Lecture Series, hosted by the College's Senior Common Room and in partnership with the al-Sabah Programme, intended to address this apparent gap by focusing on elections in five important cases of the United States, the United Kingdom, EU elections, India, and Mexico in 2024, each 'historic' in its own right.

This year, we were delighted to welcome speakers from the Universities of Strathclyde, Cardiff, Durham, Newcastle, and University College Dublin to present engaging talks to our students, staff, SCR members and members of the local community. Following each talk, the discussion continued over dinner, with complimentary places available for students to engage with our world-leading expert speakers. This year, each of the lectures was recorded and information about how to access these recordings will soon be circulated. A summary of this year's lectures can be found below:

Global Dynamics 1 -

The State of Britain Following July 2024 General Election Professor Sir John Curtice, University of Strathclyde

We welcomed the country's most authoritative commentator and expert on British electoral politics to kick off our series with an in-depth investigation of July 2024's UK general election. This lecture was particularly important in helping us to arrive at a deeper understanding of the electoral process in the case of the UK and thus help us understand the policy implications of Labour's sweeping victory and its impact on the political system and on our lives.

Global Dynamics 2 -

Populism and the Far Right in European Elections Dr Marta Lorimer, Cardiff University

Europe has been in electoral turmoil for some time, but elections since 2023/4 have arguably been far more consequential than expected. In this session we hosted Dr Lorimer, who is an authority on populism and elections in

Global Dynamics 3 -Twist or Bust: The 2024 US Presidential Elections Professor Scott Lucas, University College Dublin

Of all the elections taking place around the world these days, perhaps the US one has attracted most attention, and also concern, depending on one's point of view. Well, we had been through the election and witnessed what transpired on 5th November 2024 and had had time to digest its outcome and America's and the world's response to it. But we needed to know more. So, in this session we learnt from one of Europe's greatest commentators on the US, Professor Lucas, who analysed the results of the election and its domestic and foreign policy implications.

Global Dynamics 4 -2024 Elections: BJP, Modi's Populism and the fate of Indian Democracy

Dr Eva-Maria Nag, Durham University

India is said to be the world's largest democracy, but we in the UK know little about its electoral process, let alone the political dynamics of the country in which religion, ethnicity and ideology continue to play such an important part. In this lecture a closer observer of India, Dr Nag, explored the implications of Modi's re-election in 2024 and what his trimmed majority will mean for India and for foreign relations.

Global Dynamics 5 -Mexicans Elect: Democracy, Violence and Party Politics Dr Rosario Aguilar, Newcastle University

We in this country rarely pay sufficient attention to the process of political change in Latin America and sadly Mexico tends to be ignored by virtually all of our mainstream media. Last year's presidential election has drawn some attention because of the candidates' gender arguably, but there was so much more in political and policy terms to the recent election, which needed to be brought to the attention of our commentaries. So, in this session one of the country's best regarded authorities on Mexican politics, Dr Aguilar, focussed our minds on the changes in motion in that important Latin American country.

The new academic year began quickly with an intake of 30 new members joining the club. We hit the ground running, with the men's 1st four making the final at senate cup and a brace of good results at Durham Autumn Small Boats Head. 
