pneumatology.

The sources and methods of Christian theology and the development of

methods in Christian doctrine.

The application of methods of Christian doctrine to contemporary

issues and problems.

Some limited primary texts by major theologians.

Some other forms of theological discourse, such as art, hymnody etc.
