Aims:	<p>To offer students a broad introductory overview of the history of the church.</p> <p>To show students how particular Christian theologies exist within their historical, social and cultural contexts.</p> <p>To introduce students to theological sources from different periods of Christian history.</p> <p>To excite a passion for church history and historical theology and equip students for further study at level 5.</p> <p>To encourage students to begin to recognise how elements of their own practice and experience have been shaped by church history.</p>
Content:	<p>This module will include:</p> <p>A broad overview of church history up to and including the twentieth century.</p> <p>Attention to the church's social, cultural and political context.</p> <p>Consideration of the historical development of doctrine, exegesis and worship.</p> <p>Attention to the historical roots of students' denominational identity.</p> <p>Study of a number of key primary sources (in translation where not originally in English), including some art and material culture.</p>
Learning Outcomes:	<p>By the end of this module students will be able to:</p> <p>Subject Knowledge [SSK 2]</p> <p>Investigate and describe competently one or more major developments in church history.</p> <p>Discuss intelligently one or more key issues in contemporary Christian thought about these developments.</p> <p>Subject Skills [SSS 3]</p>

Describe how aspects of Christian history can be appropriately related to experience and practice in the context of discipleship, mission and ministry.

Identify, gather and evaluate source materials for a specific purpose.

Evaluate the appropriateness of different approaches, communicating their findings sensitively and respectfully, showing self-awareness about their own beliefs, commitments and prejudices.
