Exploring Globalisation, the World Church and Mission (TMM1371)

To engender an awareness of the world church and the impact of globalisation on it, including an initial understanding of the implications for the church in Britain. To enable students to understand key features of inculturation and syncretism and the differences between them. To encourage students to reflect on the learning from this module in relation to their own ministerial development and to the life of the local church. Content: A brief introduction to major global movements, issues, actors and influences within the worldwide Christian community (historically and currently). Introduction to globalisation and its consequences for technological, environmental, political, economic, cultural issues and for faith communities. Issues of contextualisation of the gospel in a multi faith society in the UK and in non-European and non-Western contexts. The implications of globalisation for the church in Britain today and its mission.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of this module students will be able to:

Investigate and describe competently the impact of globalisation and the global Christian mission, and analyse the questions these raise for the mission of the Church.

Explore and discuss knowledgeably current issues within the churches of a non-European, non-Western region of the world.
