

Theological Perspectives on Community Development and Organising (TMM2771)

Aims: To explore theologies of community, community development and community organising, and the differing approaches to these theologies within different Christian traditions (e.g. Catholic, Anglican, Evangelical and Radical traditions).

To study what it means to enable communities to develop confidence, capacity, skills and relationships that shape collective action and challenge imbalances of power.

To study what it means to enable communities to recognise and build on their existing skills, knowledge and expertise.

To develop an understanding of how to promote the rights of communities to define themselves, their priorities and agendas for action.

To develop an understanding of how to provide the space for communities to develop critical, creative, independent and active decision-making and participation.

Content:

This module offers:

An exploration of the themes, scope and approaches to community, community development and community organising in theology.

An examination of the work of individual theologians, comparing and contrasting their work, and assessing its relevance for the student's context within church and community.

A focus on how theology can facilitate and assist community empowerment as well as enabling dialogue and understanding between church and community.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of this module students will be able to:

Compare and contrast various theologies of community, community development and community organising, showing awareness of the praxis that emerges from them.

Describe models of community development and organising, analysing their theological implications.

Reflect intelligently on how theologies of community development can be integrated with other theological thinking

Relate thinking about community development, organising and empowerment to wider discussions on discipleship, mission and ministry in the church.

Identify, gather, analyse and evaluate textual source materials for a range of purposes.
