Aims: Enable students to review the ways in which theology has engaged with

industrial, semi-urban or other relevant contexts.

Foster critical reflection on the theology and practice of mission and

ministry in marginalised contexts.

Enable students to investigate and critically reflect on the

appropriateness of various approaches to ministry and mission with

marginalised communities.

Equip students to analyse particular marginalised communities and use

this appropriately to inform mission and ministry in those contexts.

Content: A critical survey of various approaches to ministry and mission with

marginalised communities.

The module can be used to explore this theme in a range of geographical / social contexts or in just one particular context (eg.

Urban / refugees).

Critical engagement with theological thinking on marginalised communities. As appropriate, this will draw in scholarly work from relevant fields such as anthropology, economics, sociology, politics and

cultural studies.

Exploration of the lived experiences of those who live in marginalised

communities.

The place of empirical research in investigation of particular

marginalised communities.
