Aims:

Provide students with an overview of contemporary theological

approaches to the subject of place and space.

Enable students to compare and critically evaluate different approaches to the theology of place and its relationship to non-

theological disciplines such as the social sciences.

Enable students to rigorously, reflexively and creatively investigate a particular place from a theological perspective,

including use of quantitative and qualitative methods.

To encourage critical reflection on the relationship of power to place and how such relationships might inform and shape

approaches to ministry and mission.

Content: Overview of approaches that have been taken to the

development of place and space as a subject of theological

investigation.

The influence of other disciplines on theological perspectives of

place with a particular focus on the social sciences.

The importance of place for understanding issues such as power,

culture, identity (including religious identity) and

inclusion/exclusion.

The investigation of place using practical-theological

methodologies, including the use of empirical research methods.

The relevance of place for mission, for example the potential

formation of 'redemptive places' and the practices and

spiritualties such as reflexive-practice or re-neighbouring that

might open up an experience of such places.
