Aims:	To enable students to undertake a systematic, in-depth study of Global South indigenous religious heritage
	To enable students critically to evaluate the connection between indigenous religions, Christianity and Christian mission.
	An in-depth analysis of primal worldviews that shape some indigenous religious traditions of the Global South.
Content:	This module gives students an opportunity for an in-depth study of an indigenous religious tradition from the Global South, how such a religious tradition relates to culture and shapes a people's identity, and how it finds expression in, for example. oratures, rituals and artistic forms including music and dance. Using examples of some ethnic religious systems (and their deities, shrines, festivals, etc), the module creates space for students to engage in a systematic and holistic manner with religio-cultural belief systems that shape life in some parts of the Global South. It explores how Christianity has encountered and engaged with indigenous religions. Overall, it allows students to understand and critically analyse the pervasive role of religion in life, culture and society in some parts of the world.
