


Content:

Oinike Harefa challenges mission from a postcolonial feminist perspective and constructs a model of evangelism rooted in women's voices and perspectives. According to Harefa, evangelism should be about 'sharing gifts' rather than domination, and storytelling is a key component of this: 'there is power in storytelling and that power is not intended to dominate (power over), but to be shared (power with); that power does not take the form of coercion, but an invitation to act' (8).

This is a collection of essays written in the Philippines against the backdrop of

poverty, authoritarianism and injustice. The essays fall within the theme of the Church's action in the world, and the first, 'The Task of the Church: Evangelism and Social Action,' outlines the argument central to the book – that

evangelism and social action, while distinct, are both intrinsic aspects of the gospel. The book is in three parts: the first explores the subversive potential of the Christian faith; the second surveys various approaches to societal transformation the Church has taken; and the third shares lessons learned from the author's personal experience.

Content:

A decolonial critique of modern mission practice that has emerged from

Woodley's positionality as someone who spans both Indigenous and Western cultures and worldviews. Woodley calls the Church in the West to deep listening, in order to learn a new way of conceiving of mission among the cultural other. At the end of each chapter, Woodley provides questions for reflection and discussion.


Content:

In this short and accessible chapter, Faafetai Aiava uses the image of the womb to call for a rebirth of mission in light of its complex past in Oceania.

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

Content:

In this chapter, Harvey Kwiyani discusses the history of missionary

Kwiyani notes the need for connection between different cultural groups, such as British and non-Western Christians, and the potential impact such engagement could have on mission and evangelism in the country.

Nsenga-Ngoy explores cross-cultural evangelism, something he sees as the responsibility of all. Evangelism is not about pitting narratives against each other, since no culture can claim to have a monopoly on the gospel. Rather, evangelism is relational, requiring genuine encounter, and the ability to journey alongside others as God's story is interpreted in the particular stories of people and communities.

Nalwamba, Kuzipa: WCC Interview (World Mission and Evangelism)



Content:

In the first 4 minutes of this interview, Kuzipa Nalwamba outlines WCC's approach to mission. She underscores the WCC's belief that fundamentally, mission is God's, notes the emphasis on mission from the margins, and connected to this, the importance of polycentric missiology for WCC; that is, that the good news must come from everywhere to everywhere.
