Durham Geography and the pandemic

Like all universities, Durham has faced significant challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic. In March 2020 we were amongst the very first UK universities to move to online teaching. The shift online took place in less than a week and it is an enormous testament to the hard work and adaptability of all our staff and our students that we were able to complete term 2 teaching without major incident. Students took all their exams online in summer 2020, and since then we have moved to a blended model where most teaching is online but students have a small number of in-person teaching sessions where we can do so with social distancing. Staff spent much of the summer and autumn on 2020 re-designing module and recording lectures to post online, and as anyone who has done this will testify vocally – online teaching takes substantially longer to prepare and do than in-person teaching! Unfortunately, the biggest effect of the pandemic has been on our fieldtrips. Both students and staff value enormously our programme of fieldtrips in the UK and overseas but we have had to take the painful decision to cancel our field trips in Easter and summer 2020, as well as Easter field trips in 2021. Staff are innovating to provide UK-based or online alternatives but we all look forward to getting back into the field as soon as we can safely do so.

Recent highlights and achievements of the department

The Department of Geography has maintained its leading position and remains amongst the top handful of geography departments in the UK and globally.

Our staff and students have done amazing things and received some impressive accolades, but over the past year our students have really excelled in winning national dissertation prizes and commendations, including James Lockwood (*British Hydrological Society prize*), Riyana Dyson (*RGS Race Culture and Equality group prize*), Hannah Sellgren (*RGS commendation*), Katy Simms (*Space, Sexualities and Queer Research Group (SSQRG) Prize*, and Madeleine Woods and Ellie Day (*Quaternary Research Association prizes*).

Well done to all – the standard of the work produced by our undergraduates is wonderful.



Dai Morgan memorial/remembrance

We were sad to hear during the first lockdown of 2020 that a former lecturer, Dr Dai Morgan, had died aged 92. Dai will be recalled by many former students and staff alike: he was a popular character, and passionate in his work on Africa and in promoting African Universities, and was kind and dedicated to many cohorts of Durham Geography students that he taught. Despite a limited funeral event due to the pandemic we were able to pass on a large number of departmental recollections and fond memories that became part of his funeral service.



History of the Department

Durham Geography has a tradition of education and research stretching back to 1928. We have created a written history of the Department, reflecting the diversity of intellectual themes that we have worked on (and often pioneered) and the range of people who have passed through the doors of the West Building and its predecessors.

This work was led by Professor Ian Simmons – well known to many of you – and this wonderful and comprehensive document is now available on the alumni website to download. We hope it will be a living document and will evolve and develop along with the Geography Department for the next 90 years.



Our website has changed

Durham weather and climate since 1841: call for photos

Emeritus Professor Tim Burt has been involved in an ongoing project to write a history of the weather records from the Durham Observatory. The Observatory was completed in 1841 and meteorological observations started immediately.

Whilst there was a need for temperature and pressure measurements to correct the astronomical readings, the weather records quickly took on an importance of their own and summaries soon appeared in the *Durham Advertiser*.

Gordon Manley established the Geography Department in 1928 and he was probably the country's best-known climatologist of the twentieth century. He took an immediate interest in the weather station at the Observatory, and his 1941 paper on the Durham meteorological record established its importance.



The Department has run the weather station since then, producing monthly and annual reports to this day. Observations ceased in 1999 when the last resident observer, Audrey Warner, retired, and the readings have since been obtained using an automatic weather station run by the Met Office. Apart from the Radcliffe Observatory in Oxford, Durham has the longest series of weather records for any British university.

Stephen Burt (no relation!) and Professor Tim Burt have now published a book on the Oxford record, entitled *Oxford Weather and Climate since 1767* (2019, Oxford University Press). Tim had run the Radcliffe Meteorological Station for a decade before moving to Durham, and has run the Durham weather station for the last twenty years. Now, Stephen and Tim are writing a book about the Durham weather records. It will contain chapters about the months, seasons and calendar year, followed by a discussion of climate change. Finally, the book will contain a chronology of weather events – and this is where you come in. If you have ever wanted to learn more about international boundaries, IBRU, the Department's Centre for Borders Research, has developed an online training course to introduce people to the world of borders and international boundaries.

'Introduction to International Boundaries: Definition, Delimitation and Dispute Resolution' is an online training course that provides a simple, contextual overview of international boundaries and the practical measures that can be taken to resolve international boundary disputes.

Through a series of short online lectures and a final practical exercise, the course explores the relevance of borders and looks at land and maritime boundary disputes, before covering methods available for dispute resolution.
