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A: THE DEPARTMENT

Facilities

The Department is located in the Dawson Building on the Lower Mountjoy Site. Most of the staff offices are on the first floor, which is arranged in the form of a hollow rectangle, which you can walk round. On this floor are also several teaching rooms, notably the Birley Room, the Seminar Room, the Kiln Laboratory (Computing Room) and the Fenwick Human Osteology Laboratory, all of which are used for larger or smaller classes, the Conservation Laboratory, the Administrative Staff Offices, the Stable Isotope laboratory, the Ancient DNA laboratory, the Digital Visualisation Lab and the photocopiers. On the ground floor is the Fenwick Laboratory (used for teaching), the Environmental Archaeology Research Laboratory suite supporting commercial and academic research in environmental archaeology, the Luminescence Dating laboratory, and the Environmental Archaeology Teaching Laboratory. In the basement are the rooms supporting research in biometrics, informatics and Anglo Saxon Stone Sculpture. On the second floor are more staff offices and postgraduate rooms.

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B: DEGREE STRUCTURE

All degrees at Durham have a modular structure, consisting of six modules each year for two years, while in the last year the teaching is carried out mostly in small groups. Modules are usually studied over all three terms of the teaching year, except for the level 3 ones which usually run in one term. All modules are examined or assessed in the year in which they are taught: this means that at the end of the first year there are preliminary examinations, and that the final degree class is determined by the examinations taken in the second and third year.

Choice of Modules

IMPORTANT NOTE FOR STUDENTS: PLEASE READ <u>BEFORE</u> COMPLETING YOUR LEARNING AGREEMENT

At Durham University European (Erasmus+) agreements are signed by individual university departments and are not university-wide agreements. This means that, in general, students will have to choose modules (courses) within the Durham University department through which the European (Erasmus+) agreement with their home university has been signed (students should check with the European (Erasmus+) Coordinator in their university if they are not sure which department this is). Modules offered by other departments are subject to availability and can only be taken with prior consent from the relevant department. Certain restrictions may also apply to courses in some departments and students need to follow the advice below carefully before completing their Learning Agreements.

Please clearly indicate the modules you wish to take on your Learning Agreement (included in your application package) for approval by the respective department(s). Before completing your Learning Agreement, it is very important that you read carefully the relevant departmental section(s) of the ECTS Handbook to check which modules are available to you and any restrictions which may apply. Please note that students registered on an undergraduate programme can only take undergraduate modules (Level 1-3). It is imperative that a properly completed Learning Agreement is submitted as part of the application form. Only complete applications can be processed.
