

THE PROCESS OF LANGUAGE-BASED BORDER-MAKING HAS HISTORICALLY BEEN ASSOCIATED WITH THE PROCESS OF NATION-BUILDING WHERE THE FORMULA OF 'ONE NATION — ONE LANGUAGE' WAS EXERCISED THROUGH GOVERNMENTAL POLICIES OF MONOLINGUALISM OR DOMINEERING OF ONE PARTICULAR LANGUAGE (VARIANT) OVER OTHERS. BUT LINGUISTIC IDEOLOGIES HAVE ALSO PROVED TO BE A DRIVING FORCE FOR MINORITIES WITHIN FORCEDLY HOMOGENISED SPACES ON THEIR WAY TO SELF-IDENTIFICATION AS OPPOSING TO STANDARDISED LANGUAGES, DOMINEERING DISCOURSES, OR SOCIAL INEQUALITIES BROUGHT BY LINGUISTIC FACTORS. IN SHIFTING CONTEMPORARY CONTEXTS OF POST-COLONIAL RE-INVENTIONS, SUPRANATIONAL ASSOCIATIONS AND MULTIDIRECTIONAL MOBILITY FLOWS, LANGUAGE IDEOLOGIES HAVE ALSO OBTAINED A NEW SHAPE OF CROSS-BORDER PHENOMENA WHICH CONSOLIDATE COMMUNITIES TRANSNATIONALLY.

THE SEMINAR BRINGS TOGETHER RESEARCHERS WORKING IN POST-SOVIET AND WIDER EURASIAN CULTURAL SPACES TO DISCUSS PERSPECTIVES ON THE CONCEPT OF 'LANGUAGE IDEOLOGIES' AND ITS RELATION TO NATIONAL, CULTURAL, AND SOCIAL BORDERS.
