
What is Combined Honours?

Academically ambitious degree programme

- Combined Honours is an undergraduate degree framework which gives you the opportunity to design your own degree, going beyond disciplinary boundaries.
- Suited to individual interests, strengths and career plans

Flexible & emphasises choice

 In Combined Honours programmes, you study two, three, or even four subjects, giving you far more choice and flexibility than within Single Honours or Joint Honours courses.





Multidisciplinary or interdisciplinary?

Build your own degree

Social Sciences subjects

Anthropology, Archaeology, Education, Geography, Politics, International Relations, Sociology, Sport, Economics, Management and Marketing

Arts and Humanities subjects

English Studies, History, Modern Languages and Cultures (MLaC), Visual Studies, Music, Philosophy, Theology and Classics



Combined Honours in Social Sciences

- = Social Sciences
- + (some optional) Arts and Humanities and/or Business

Liberal Arts

- = Arts and Humanities
- + (some optional) Social Sciences and/or Business



FSOC1011: Decolonising Knowledge & Power



- Introduces students to concepts and case studies related to decolonisation, with specific focus on the themes of knowledge and power.
- Introduces students to research methods and design from a decolonisation perspective.
- What does it mean to decolonise education and research?
- Promotes the value of a multidisciplinary and intersectional perspective: fieldtrips, film nights, novels, etc.



Move from subject to theme



 First years tend to choose modules by the subjects they have liked at school.

 Second and third years start to think about modules in a more thematic way so that they can build a programme of study around areas such as the Cold War; social policy; social inequality; belonging and identity; development.



What kind of programme is CHSS?

Build your own JH programme

- You can combine subjects where there is no alternative programme
- (e.g. Politics/History)

Create a parallel programme

- You can combine subjects where there is an alternative programme
- (e.g. PPE) but in a more flexible way

Flexible bespoke programme

- You can combine up to 4 subjects to pursue a tailormade degree
- (e.g. Economics, Geog, Spanish, or Sociology, Politics, Education, Business)



Variety of dissertation options



Every CHSS student is required to complete a dissertation in their final year.

You can conclude your studies with a dissertation from one of our programme departments, or pursue an interdisciplinary project.



Different directions... but not too many!







Programme regulations summary

Level	Options
1	 120 credits from 2, 3 or 4 subjects At least 60 credits in Social Sciences
2	 120 credits from 2, 3 or 4 subjects At least 60 credits in Social Sciences
Possible year abroad or placement year	
3	 Dissertation (normally 40 credits) 80 credits from 2 or 3 subjects (inc diss subject) At least 60 credits in the Social Sciences



Year Abroad or Placement Year Opportunities

- CHSS students who study a modern language can transfer to a four-year version of their programme, which includes a Year Abroad, during which they will study at a university, or teach English in schools, or undertake internships in companies or other organisations.
- CHSS students who don't study a language can also transfer to a four-year version of their programme, including the Year Abroad, if they secure a place to study at one of Durham's partner universities via the Overseas Exchange programme.
- We also have a placement year variant for students who wish to undertake a 40 week paid work placement between their second and final year.





What restrictions are there?

- Programme regulations (minimum 60 credits p.a. Social Sciences)
- Module availability
- Timetable constraints
- Director approval
- Module pre-requisites and co-requisites
- Some modules have subject-specific entry requirements (History, English, Music, MFL, Economics)





What support is there?

- Weekly office hours with CHSS Director/Deputy
- Weekly office hours with lecturers
- SharePoint page for CHSS and fortnightly eBulletin
- Academic advice/guidance from departments
- Combined Coordinator in all Soc Sci depts
- CHSS Student Social Society

Entry requirements: typical offer

GCE A level A*AA IB 38 points (666 at higher level)

We don't accept the EPQ as part of our entry requirements, but this project is a great way to evidence experience of interdisciplinarity in your school studies so do mention it in your personal statement if you're taking it.




Substitute personal statement

Many applicants apply to a range of single honours courses alongside a combined honours application.

Subject entry requirements

Economics

A at A level (or equivalent) in Mathematics (IB Higher level 6, Standard level 7)

English Literature

A at A level (or equivalent) in English Literature [or in English Language and Literature]

History

A at A level (or equivalent) in History

Music

A at A level (or equivalent) in Music



Subject entry requirements continued

Languages (as principal subjects) – advanced:
 French / German / Spanish / Italian / Russian

A at A level (or equivalent) in the relevant language

Languages (as principal subjects) – ab initio (1):
 German / Spanish / Italian / Russian / Arabic

A at A level (or equivalent) in any modern language

Languages (as principal subjects) – ab initio (2):
 Chinese / Japanese

A at A level (or equivalent) in any modern language desirable but not essential, since this is not required for the Chinese and Japanese Studies programmes



Employment prospects



- Destination figures for 2022 are excellent with 90% of CHSS leavers securing employment and/or going on to further study within 15 months of graduating. This exceeds the university average of 89%.
- The average salary of our graduates is £31,350, which also exceeds the university average of £30,480.
- Employers like the Combined degree for the obvious reason that graduates come out with a range of skills from the different subjects they have studied.
- We run CHSS careers/CV workshops to support you each year.



Graduate Destinations

- •Some of the recent graduates of our programmes have gone on to:
- Masters and PhD programmes at a range of places including Durham, Oxford, Cambridge, Edinburgh, St Andrews, LSE, UCL.
- Over a third of our graduates go on to PG study each year.
- PGCEs, Law conversion courses, and other graduate programmes, relating to journalism, financial services, and management.
- Careers in teaching, banking, auditing, marketing, public relations, human resources, publishing, retail management, the civil service, arts management, public administration, and the voluntary sector.



In 2013, The Independent reported that <u>Durham</u> University is thought to have the highest rate of inter-student marriages in Britain. Roughly 72% of students will marry a fellow <u>Durham</u> alumnus, a third of couples starting a relationship only after graduation. This is by far the highest percentage of any UK university, with the national average typically standing at 18-20%.
