

Third/Final Year (Specialization):

- Option for Year Abroad / Placement Year followed by a final year OR
- UG Dissertation
- Choice of specialist modules in core or other subject areas and/or one from another department (incl. foreign language)



Placement years

- Good attendance record at level 1 & 2
- You must pass all level 2 modules
- Takes place in the third year of the programme
- Secure an approved placement totalling at least 40 weeks
 - Can be one long one or up to 3 shorter ones
- Examples include: House of Commons, Welsh Parliament, political affairs at Airbus, the Office for National Statistics




Research Spotlight: Election Violence
