





BA in Modern Languages and Cultures

- ■Four-year course (Year 3 spent abroad)
- •6 languages:
 - Arabic (plus Persian), French, German,
 Italian, Russian, Spanish (plus Catalan)
- ■Very flexible
 - •One, two, or three languages in Year 1; maximum of two thereafter
 - Wide range of beginner languages in Year 1
- Six modules per year in Years 1, 2, and 4
 - Core language
 - Cultural modules (culture, history, politics)
 - One or two modules outside of MLAC if doing single honours

- Four-year course

 - Combined Honours: Social Sciences-focused
