Durham University Orchestral Society also celebrated 60 years in Durham Cathedral with a vibrant premiere by student composer Maxwell Richards-Clarke and a commanding performance of Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 5. With passionate playing across all sections, DUOS once again proved their exceptional standard and enduring musical spirit across generations.

Another stand-out concert of the season was the Chamber Choir's Under the Greenwood Tree. Bringing together sensitive and complex arrangements of English music new and old, the night proved a musically intricate yet intensively moving evening of song. The summer also brought countless theatrical performances. DULOG's Rocky Horror Show was a bold triumph, performing with joyful camp enthusiasm through a heat wave to sold-out houses, capturing the chaotic magic of this cult classic.

Many theatre groups also ventured on tour, not least The Durham Revue, who cemented themselves as the preeminent student sketch group on the scene by winning the Best Sketch Show Derek Award at the internationally-renowned Edinburgh Fringe. Durham Opera Ensemble's production of Iolanthe also showed at the International Gilbert and Sullivan Festival in Buxton, and swept the awards at UniFest, winning four awards, including Best Show.

Castle Theatre Company also toured their sell-out Twelfth Night to dozens of locations across the south of England, bringing their trademark actormusicianship and comic chops.

With a brand-new year fast approaching at Durham University, we're excited to kick off our year with a thrilling new season of theatre and music. With glorious symphonies, hilarious comedies, black tragedy and jazzy fun, there's a little something for everyone.

And take a look at the exciting projects coming up in the New Year, including DULOG's annual Gala Durham production, *Grease!*, and a 200-musician performance of Verdi's gargantuan Requiem in the magnificent Durham Cathedral.



Striking, darkly hilarious, musically brilliant

Attend the dark, witty and Tony Award-winning tale of love, murder and revenge set against the backdrop of 19th century London.

An infamous tale, Sweeney Todd, an unjustly exiled barber, returns to nineteenth century London, seeking vengeance against the lecherous judge who framed him and ravaged his young wife. The road to revenge leads Todd to Mrs. Lovett, a resourceful proprietress of a failing pie shop, above which, he opens a new barber practice. Mrs. Lovett's luck sharply shifts when Todd's thirst for blood inspires the integration of an ingredient into her meat pies that has the people of London lining up... and the carnage has only just begun!

Extremely popular with opera companies and in concert presentation, Sweeney Todd is equally effective as an intimate chamber musical. Featuring two unforgettable star turns and some of the most chilling music ever written for the stage, this masterpiece is sure both to thrill and delight audiences.

Twisting. Shocking.

A cry for humanity in a time of war.

Durham University Choral Society, described as possessing "a warm and finely balanced" sound (The Guardian, 2024), join forces with the players of Durham University's leading Orchestras to bring a vibrant programme of choral and symphonic music to Newcastle Cathedral.

Conducted by Tim Burke (Chorus Director for Royal Northern Sinfonia Chorus and Musical Director of Tête à Tête Opera), our evening of music begins with the rousing "Gloria" by Francis Poulenc, a radiant work by the French 20th century composer that spreads joyous praise with a modern twist.

Our second half takes the audience on an extended journey influenced by the First World War from Vaughan Williams' perspective, with a choral-symphonic work entitled "Dona Nobis Pacem" (give us peace). With introspective slower movements and the haunting fanfares of "Beat! Beat! Drums" Williams brings these tragic memories to life and depicts the light of peace emerging through the darkness.


